2. A _____ in Praise (1b-5)

A. _____ should we Praise the Lord?

Psalm 150:1 ...Praise God in his sanctuary: Praise him in the firmament of his power.

IN A PLACE OF WORSHIP

Definition—Sanctuary: a consecrated place where the deity dwells and where sacred objects are kept and worship takes place.

OUT IN THE CREATION (IN THE OPEN)

Definition—Firmament: the expanse on which celestial bodies appear to be projected; which may have been believed to be solid.

_____ — *essential to our praise*

Psalm 40:1–3 I waited patiently for the Lord; And he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. 2 He brought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, And set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings. 3 And he hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God: Many shall see it, and fear, and shall trust in the Lord.

Psalm 150:3–5 Praise him with the sound of the trumpet: Praise him with the psaltery and harp. 4 Praise him with the timbrel and dance: Praise him with stringed instruments and organs. 5 Praise him upon the loud cymbals: Praise him upon the high sounding cymbals.

TRUMPETS — the commanding notes

PSALTERY — (lute) calm notes

HARP — gentle and sweet

TIMBREL — festive accompanied by dance

STRINGED INSTRUMENTS — the cello, the bass viol, the violin, the mandolin, the guitar

ORGAN — (flute; Genesis 4:20-21) the flute, the oboe, the clarinet

CYMBALS — (Percussion Instruments) carsplitting punctuations to their praise song

3. A _____ of Praise (6)

Psalm 150:6 Let every thing that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord.

Luke 19:40 And he answered and said unto them, I tell you that, if these should hold their peace, the stones would immediately cry out.
